Club News - Hampton Pier Yacht Club, Herne Bay - Disappointing in number, but not lacking in enthusiasm 6 keen Streaker sailors entered for the open meeting held at Hampton Pier Yacht Club, Herne Bay, on the 20th and 21st of May.

Mike Fairley the only lone sailor in attendance from Potters Bar found the sea on Saturday in the first race to his liking and gave the local members a run for their money, finishing fourth, and to prove how evenly matched the Streaker can be at one time during this race every boat took a turn in the lead, and when David James eventually came over the line to win this race, the rest of the fleet followed within seconds of each other to finish.

The next two races held on Sunday proved to be a handful for anyone who wants to sail the Streaker on open sea to it's new handicap.

With four foot waves and a typical Thames Estuary chop throwing surf up on the shingle beach, launching alone was a major achievement.

On a triangle course including a reaching start, this race had a ragged beginning, but once away, the planing experience on the way to the first mark was fast and thrilling.

Beating to windward against the large waves was likened to sitting in a bath on top of a bucking bronco, large waves were constantly breaking into the

boat, and the only solution was to leave the bailers open and keep going at all costs.

Alan Hamson H.P.Y.C. sailing the Aqua Sprint demo boat was the only capsize casualty in this race, but was upright again in seconds to sail on to fourth place.

"Leave it cleated in by all means when you go about, but grab it quick when

you get there".

The last leg was also a reach and promoted by a 4-5 north westerly and rolling waves, the ride was a combination of surfing and planing, and during this last leg in the second race Dave Finnis surfed a couple of large waves and just robbed Cliff Gay of a second place, David James again taking the honours. Mike Fairley with a baptism of fire for his first venture on the sea did well to stay upright, but a point to remember here for anyone who wants to sail in a blow, bolt and plate your traveller dead-eyes, Mike's tore out of the deck on the first lap and he had to retire.

The third and final race on Sunday was held over the same course, but with a fast ebbing tide tactics were different. By this event with the wind and the sea still in a state of anger, backs were aching and muscles beginning to hurt which were still unknown, never-the-less with one final rally all boats took to the water for the last time, and with an almost line abreast start for everyone, boats were again planing off to the windward mark at full speed for s repeat

performance.

Cliff Gay managed to pull well ahead after the second lap and held his position to win this race, followed by Daves Finnis in second place and David James third. The final placing was subject to a protest on David James for ooching in the second race, but with the state of the sea and prevailing conditions to contend with, this was not proved. Overheard from a fellow comedian in the changing rooms was the cry for a plea of "Guilty but Insane"!

To all our fellow Streaker members who have not yet experienced the thrill of sailing on the open sea, can we say come and have a go, Mike Fairley is coming back

for more!

Cliff Gay with the best position as an Association Member won the very nice trophy presented by Aqua Sprint for this meeting, and it will be held by him until next year when we hope to see many more Streakers competing for it again.

GENERAL NOTES

Stewarthy Water Sports Club have kindly accepted the Streaker Class for the second National Championships on Stewarthy Water (near Bedford on the M-I. Motorway) on Saturday 2nd September. Owners are welcome on Friday 1st for practice sailing, and a practice race will be arranged if required.

The event will be held on Stewarthy Water which provides 120 acres of water: a map is enclosed showing how to reach the Club, which offers all facilities, with changing rooms and showers. Light refreshments can be provided, but please advise in advance numbers required. The bar licence requires temporary Membership and all Helmsmen will automatically be made temporary Members. If the names of others who will be attending are advised, Membership can be extended to them also.

Ample parking is available for cars and boats, and a camping area for tents and caravans will be available on Friday and Saturday nights.

Note: Dogs, if brought, MUST be kept on a lead.

RACING

The series of races will be held under the rules of the I.Y.R.U. including YRA prescriptions, the Class Association, and in accordance with the sailing instructions. There will be three races with the best two results to count. Sailing instructions will be issued to competitors on arrival.

- * Approximate starting times may be altered subject to conditions.
- (a) All competing boats must hold and produce a valid Measurement Certificate.
- (b) Helmsmen (or Owners) must be Members of the Streaker Association.
- (c) Helmsmen must wear a buoyancy aid at all times. Failure to do so will result in disqualifaction.
- (d) All competing boats must have Insurance cover with a minimum of £100,000,00. third party indemnity. Evidence of this cover must be produced.

PRIZES

Prizes will be awarded to the winner of each race and the Championship Trophy will be awarded to the overall winner.

In addition, prizes will be awarded to the next Helmsman based on the square root of the number of entries.

ENTRY

The entry fee for each boat will be £3.50. and entries should be sent in as soon as possible. The closing date for entries is $30 \, \text{th}$ August, 1978
